Location: **Sault Ste. Marie** (pronounced / su:seIntmə'ri:/) is the oldest city in the <u>state</u> of <u>Michigan</u>. It is at the eastern edge of Michigan's <u>Upper Peninsula</u>, on the <u>Canadian</u> border, separated from its twin city of <u>Sault Ste. Marie</u>, <u>Ontario</u> - the oldest city in the <u>Canadian province</u> of <u>Ontario</u> - by the <u>St. Mary's River</u>.

Formally founded in 1668 by Father <u>Jacques Marquette</u> as *one* city, then split into two in 1797 (when the <u>Upper Peninsula</u> was transferred from the province of <u>Upper Canada</u> to the United States), Sault Ste. Marie has the distinction of being the oldest settlement in both the province of <u>Ontario</u> and the state of <u>Michigan</u>.

Sault Sainte Marie is <u>Old French</u> meaning "Rapids of St. Mary's", a reference to the rapids in the Saint Mary's River, which joins <u>Lake Superior</u> to <u>Lake Huron</u>. (The spelling **Sault-Sainte-Marie** is more usual in <u>French</u>, but the name is written without hyphens in <u>English</u>). Either city, or the vicinity as a whole, can also be informally called **The Sault** or **The Soo**. More recently, there have been a few references to a **Greater Sault Ste. Marie**, encompassing both cities and their outlying satellite communities, although as of 2006 this term is not in widespread use.

The two cities are joined by the <u>International Bridge</u>, which connects <u>Interstate Highway 75</u> in Sault Ste. Marie, Michigan and Huron Street in Sault Ste. Marie, Ontario. Shipping traffic in the <u>Great Lakes</u> system bypasses the Saint Mary's Rapids via the American <u>Soo Locks</u>, the world's busiest canal in terms of tonnage that passes through it, while smaller recreational and tour boats use the Canadian <u>Sault Ste. Marie Canal</u>.

Sault Ste. Marie, Michigan lies within Chippewa County.

As of a 2005 U.S. Census estimate, the city's population was 14,318. It is the <u>county seat</u> of <u>Chippewa County⁶</u>. The city is the site of the <u>Soo Locks</u>, which lets ships travel between <u>Lake</u> <u>Superior</u> and the lower <u>Great Lakes</u>. Although the locks are not as busy as in past years, a considerable amount of domestic and foreign commerce passes through them. People come from around the world to view close up the ships passing through the locks. The largest ships are 1,000 feet long by 105 feet wide. These are domestic carriers (called <u>lakers</u>) that are too large to transit the <u>Welland Canal</u> around <u>Niagara Falls</u> and thus are land-locked. Foreign ships (termed salties) are smaller.

Sault Ste. Marie is home to <u>Lake Superior State University</u>, founded in 1946 as an extension campus of Michigan Mining and Technological College (now <u>Michigan Technological University</u>). Several famous athletes have come from Sault Ste. Marie including former NHLer <u>Cliff Barton</u>. Other famous residents include the well-known electric violinist Beth Dobias and the lesser known Margaret Shumbarger the Hungarian folk virtuoso. Sault Ste. Marie was also the home of <u>Jane</u> <u>Johnston Schoolcraft</u>, the early American Indian writer, and her husband <u>Henry Rowe</u> <u>Schoolcraft</u>, the Indian agent and ethnographer. Their houses still stand and are listed on the National Register of Historic Places.

<u>Tourism</u> is a major industry in what is usually referred to as the *Soo*. The locks and nearby Kewadin Casino, owned by the Sault Tribe of Chippewa Indians, are the major draws, as well as the forests, inland lakes and Lake Superior shoreline. The Soo is also a gateway to Lake Superior's scenic north shore through its twin city <u>Sault Ste. Marie, Ontario</u>. The two cities are connected by the large <u>Sault Ste. Marie International Bridge</u>, a steel <u>truss arch bridge</u> with suspended deck passing over the St. Mary's River.

<u>Ojibwa</u> (Chippewa) Native Americans had lived in the area, which they referred to as *Baawitigong*, for centuries, since it provided an excellent place to catch fish. In <u>1668</u>, French missionaries <u>Claude Dablon</u> and <u>Jacques Marquette</u> founded a mission, making the Sault the third oldest city west of the <u>Appalachian Mountains</u> in what is now the United States. The falls proved a choke point for shipping. Early Lake Superior ships were hauled around the rapids, much like moving a house, a process which could take weeks. Later cargoes were unloaded and hauled around the rapids and loaded onto other waiting boats. The first American lock, the State Lock, was built in <u>1855</u>.

Average Temperature: Sault Ste. Marie is among the snowiest places in Michigan, receiving an average of 128 <u>inches</u> of snow a year with a record year where 209 inches fell. Sixty-two inches of snow fell in one five-day snowstorm, including 28 inches in 24 hours, in December 1995. Sault Ste. Marie receives an average annual 34 inches of precipitation measured as equivalent rainfall.

Temperatures in Sault Ste. Marie have varied between a record low of -36°F and a record high of 98°F. Monthly average high temperatures range from a low of 13°F in January to a high of 64°F in July.[1] In an average year, only one or two days reach 90°F while 180 days fall below 32°F.

Unit's Primary Missions: Aids To Navigation within the Ste Marie's River System, Homeland Security, and Public Affairs.

Assets: The Ship is a 100' Inland Buoy Tender with a normal sailing complement of 16 people. The Ship works two seasonal buoy trips that consist of the most buoys of any unit in the entire Ninth District.



Area of Responsibility (AOR): From Whitefish Point thru the Sainte Marie's River 65 miles of Integral River that connects Lake Huron to Lake Superior to Cedarville, Michigan

Operational Clothing: Foul weather gear and other operational clothing will be issued to member shortly after arrival. You're sponsor will ask what your typical clothing sizes (S, M, L) are in order to purchase if necessary, the appropriate Personal Protective Equipment (PPE) upon your arrival.

Personal Storage Space (in Cubic Feet): Very Limited. Member is assigned a locker for uniforms and operational clothing but there is approximately 10 cubic feet available per member.

Special Procedures For Reporting After Hours: The Cutter is manned 24/7 however, if you are planning on arriving between the hours of 1600 and 0630 contact the CDO ahead of time so that we can prepare for your arrival.

Ratings Present at Unit: Cutter has Boatswain's Mates (BM) and Machinery Technicians (MK), Food Service Specialist(FS), and Electrician's Mate(EM). However, we are co-located with Sector Sault Sainte Marie at which all rates are represented.

Location Of Nearest Exchange: At the Sector on base
